Resource packages

We've created a package of resources for every section of each paper, covering each topic:

- Aspects of tragedy
- Aspects of comedy
- Elements of crime writing
- Elements of political and social protest writing.

They include specimen question commentaries, exemplar student responses, marking commentaries and guidance on how to create your own practice exam questions.

They will enable you to focus your teaching on those aspects and to work towards the relevant exam question in the specimen assessment materials. The exemplar student responses with marking commentary also give you an illustration of how the mark scheme is applied.

English e-Library

Our English e-Library, in partnership with Cambridge University Press, is a place where specially created content sits alongside the digital versions of our poetry anthologies.

Free to access for teachers to use in the classroom and for students to use independently for homework or revision, the English e-Library is intended to bring texts to life on-screen.

Guidance on non-exam assessment

Theory and independence is the non-exam assessment (NEA) component of this specification. This guidance develops and exemplifies the NEA requirements set out in the specification, and provides advice on text choice and task setting.

AQA Critical anthology

Although the Critical anthology can be used to support students' reading and study throughout the course, it has been designed specifically to support component 3, Theory and independence. There are a collection of extracts that relate to six different ways of reading literature, providing a lens through which students can look at texts.

Assess

Prepare your students for assessment with our specimen and past papers, mark schemes and example answers.

Commentaries on the specimen assessment materials

We recognise that change to assessments can be a cause of anxiety and uncertainty. To this end, we have provided commentaries on each of the new AS and A-level specimen question papers, which explain how the questions address the assessment objectives and give some suggestions as to how each task might be approached.

Specimen question papers and mark schemes

Mark schemes are prepared by the Lead Assessment Writer and considered, together with the relevant questions, by a panel of subject teachers. Ours are designed as a guide, and it must be stressed that a mark scheme is a working document that is, in many cases, further developed and expanded on the basis of students' reactions to a particular paper.

Our specimen question papers are designed to reflect the topics covered in your teaching, and can be used as a tool to prepare your students for the exam.
